





Members of the Faculty:



I am not referring to matters about which there is a legitimate dispute—as to whether, for example, the fruit with which Eve tempted Adam was really an apple; whether Bacon or Shakespeare wrote certain plays; whether Queen Elizabeth was a man or a woman. I am referring to those beliefs which are definitely erroneous.

Take, for instance, the expression, "As foolish as King Canute." Poor King Canute! From this you would assume that he *was* foolish. Yet, if you trace the story back into history, you will find that he was exceptionally wise! Wishing to show his people that he was not as powerful as they, in their flattery, tried to make him believe, he went down to the sea and commanded the tide to halt. The tide continued to rise as usual. Canute thereupon turned to his courtiers with the remark, "I am not as powerful as you say I am. You see that I cannot make the tide obey me!" Yet today the anecdote has become so garbled that we often hear the unfortunate comparison, "As foolish as King Canute who thought he could stop the tide!"

Likewise, there are many misinterpretations of old sayings. For example, "Stuff a cold and starve a fever" does not mean you may eat as much as you wish when you have a cold and fast when you have a fever, but that, if you do overeat when you have a cold, you will bring on a fever which will have to be starved!

Take the matter of proverbs:

If you accept one proverb as true, what will you do about its opposite? If you subscribe to "Many hands make light work", can you also except "Too many cooks spoil the broth"? On which of these contradictory statements will you pin your faith? "Absence makes the heart grow fonder" or "Out of sight is out of mind"?

There are many more. "Look before you leap", on the one hand; and, on the other, "Nothing venture, nothing have!" "Marry in haste, and repent at leisure" and "Happy is the wooing that is not long in doing!" "Birds of a feather flock together" and "Two of a kind seldom agree." "Friends and mules fail us at bad places" and "A friend is best found in adversity." "Faint heart ne'er won fair lady" but "Fools rush in where angels fear to tread!"

If you resemble Ichabod Crane, the gullible, whose throat was so capacious he could swallow anything, what are you going to do when you read the newspaper or listen to the propaganda regularly broadcast during any political campaign? Will you accept whatever you read or hear without bringing to bear on the matter your judgment and common sense?

To you, my classmates, as together we pause at the moment of parting, I would like to suggest this final bit of counsel. We have been taught in chemistry to weigh all in-

gredients carefully before mixing; in Algebra not to put down the sum of $3x$ plus $4x$ as $8y$; in history to balance cause and effect without prejudice; in English, to interpret the spirit as well as the letter of a man's writings.

Let us carry into the world upon whose threshold we stand tonight this same wise caution. Always, when confronted with something new or vital, let us think twice before we believe once.

Classmates, we have worked together for four enjoyable years. Our road of travel has been rather rough at times, but we have completed our journey. Now we have come to a fork in the road where some of us will turn in one direction, some in another. But, classmates, whichever path we choose, let us follow it with courage and optimism to the very end.

With my heartiest wishes for success, I must say, "Farewell, Classmates, farewell!"

Knecht, Jr., the Hornets brought home the only undefeated record in Connecticut. This year's team showed unsurpassed skill and class in taking the Housatonic League Conference and Connecticut Class "B" State Championships. This is Branford's fourth straight year as State Champions in Class "B" which they have dominated every year since it originated. This year is the first year that any Branford team has gone through its season undefeated, winning twenty-one straight, and also the first year that a Housatonic League winner has been undefeated. In Tournament competition, Branford scored the greatest total of points of any team in either Class "A" or Class "B" Tourneys and also the highest score in any single game.


