


# New High School In Branford Will Cost \$175,000

## Branford Plans for New High School



The main school building of the New Branford High School to be built on the corner of South Main and Eades Streets at a cost of \$175,000. The architecture is of English Gothic style. This is only one of the two wings that will be constructed at this time.

### Work on New Structure May Be Started by End of Month — Bids Asked For

Actual construction on the new proposed \$175,000 High school for Branford should be started before the end of August according to present plans. Bids for contractors have been called for, which will be received and opened on August 15, by the High School Committee of the town of Branford. The awarding of the contracts for construction are expected to be made following shortly after the opening of the bids.

The new High school which will be located on the corner of South Main and Eades Streets will be of the most modern type of construction. It will include every convenience for the teacher and student. It will be of English Gothic architecture. It is to be built in the shape of an "L" with two wings, thus providing for future expansion to a "U" shaped building. One of the wings will house the school proper while the other will be occupied by the auditorium and gymnasium. The school building will be 58 by 187 feet and the gymnasium and auditorium will be 52 by 77 feet.

The building will be of fireproof construction with an exterior of rough faced brick with cast stone trimmings. On the ground floor of the school will be built a cafeteria while on the first floors will be domestic science and
