



We worked hard with Edward DeJon as President, Edward Brown as Vice-president, and Thomas Corcoran as Secretary-Treasurer. We presented an assembly before the school and made plans for our Junior Prom. This was scheduled for May, and was quite successfully carried out. Plans were made, too, for getting our class rings and pins.

The Senior Beacon Board chose their successors for the school paper, with Herbert Gale as Editor-in-chief. Aided by the "old" board and Miss Murphy, an issue was presented before the year was up.

September, 1936, saw us back as Seniors with a sincere determination to succeed and make our last year one of which to be proud. We selected our officers: President, Edward DeJon; Vice-president, Robert Ward; Secretary-Treasurer, Ruth Esborn. We laughed with dignity at the under-classmen. How small they seemed.

The various clubs took up their activities under new Senior leaders and the Dramatics Club presented "Aunt Cindy Cleans Up" to a record audience. A class book committee was chosen with George Birbarie as Editor-in-chief. A card party was held to raise money for it. The French club presented a play to the High and Junior High Schools. Plans were made for the Senior Reception and the Graduation Exercises brought our high school activities to a close. We bid our teachers a fond farewell and turn our backs on the never-to-be-forgotten days in Branford High School.


During the year the Varsity Club sponsored a dance on Alumni Day and the annual Minstrel Show, both of which proved very successful.




